

## REPORT TO ABERDEENSHIRE INTEGRATION JOINT BOARD – 18 APRIL 2018

### CHIEF OFFICER'S UPDATE

This briefing aims to bring a number of issues to the attention of members of the Aberdeenshire Integration Joint Board.

#### 1. Integration Joint Board (IJB) Annual Performance Report

The IJB must produce an Annual Performance Report. It agreed to the approach presented to them at their meeting in January (Item 7 – 17/1/18).

The development session concerning Best Value (14/3/18) also made mention of the Annual Performance Report and the requirement for an appropriate amount of outcomes supported by “facts and figures” to be included.

I am delighted to inform the IJB that our External Auditor has kindly agreed to support us in the development of the report to ensure that we balance the requirements stated.

#### 2. Update on Adult Protection

The inspection on our Adult Support and Protection arrangements was concluded during 2017. Further to my March update we have now received the written report for “factual checking”. We await the final version from the inspectors. We will provide a brief for the IJB once this report is received.

#### 3. Asset Management and Capital Investment Strategy

IJB members have received a briefing on our current building assets. It is our intention to build on this work with the IJB developing a Capital Investment Strategy for the next ten to twenty years. This approach will draw on the emerging service strategy and commissioning plans to ensure we have the right buildings, in the right places, able to deliver the right services for the future.

#### 4. IJB March 2018 Development Session

I thought it would be helpful to add a very brief recap on the work undertaken by the IJB at their last development session. The session concentrated on three inter-related topics, namely, Best value, Performance Reporting and Risk.

Following the direction provided by the IJB, officers will bring forward further papers to future IJB sessions, as follows; the Annual Performance Report will identify, as a central approach to the document, our achievement of the Best

Value Principles. The revised Performance Measures will be presented in the summer. The next IJB development session will build on the review of the risk register with some work on Risk Appetite.

## 5. HMPYOI Grampian

HM Inspectorate of Prisons for Scotland have confirmed they will be on site the week of 11<sup>th</sup> June 2018, as a follow up to the inspection undertaken in late 2015. It is understood that there will be a specific, perhaps exclusive, focus on Health and Wellbeing. They will be supported by Healthcare Improvement Scotland. The three improvement 'work streams' (Primary Care, Mental Health, and Substance Misuse) continue to make progress and report into the Programme Board. In addition, a self-evaluation group is now meeting weekly (Chaired by the Partnership Manager, North), specifically looking at performance against national outcomes and standards and how this can be further enhanced.

## 6. Market Position Statement – Learning Disability

Work continues to develop a draft document for IJB consideration. A successful workshop was held on 20 March 2018 with care providers and housing associations to jointly agree what type of information is useful to include in this publication from the care market and housing perspective. Work is also ongoing with Children's Services to improve the accuracy of our predictions in terms of future needs across Aberdeenshire. We anticipate the draft document being presented to the IJB in June which will set out a summary of proposed commissioning intentions for future models of accommodation and support.

## 7. House of Care

Three practices in Aberdeenshire (Huntly, Peterhead, and Inverbervie) are amongst a cohort of eight Grampian practices piloting the House of Care approach. House of Care is an initiative which encourages a more holistic approach to the management of long term conditions, with particular focus on self-care and self-management. The evaluation from these practices will be reviewed at a Grampian level and also by our Clinical Leads. It is hoped that this initiative can explore whether the approach which has been successful in other areas would bring similar benefits to Aberdeenshire.

## 8. Minor Injury Service Review

The nine public engagement events have taken place over past few weeks with over 1000 people attending. There has also been over 4300 responses to the on-line questionnaire. The events were arranged by the local teams giving the



teams a valuable opportunity to meet and talk to members of the local communities. The local teams also felt supported by the attendance of local Elected Members and members of the IJB.

The information collected at the public events from the online questionnaires is currently being reviewed and used in the formation of recommendations which will be made to IJB in due course. It is clear from initial review however, that our network of community hospitals and the services provided within them are very highly regarded within our communities.

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
