BULLETIN REPORT: SEAFOOD TRAINING CENTRE PROJECT

1 Recommendation

The Group is recommended to:

1.1 Note the content of this Bulletin Report.

2 Discussion

- 2.1 In November 2017, North East Scotland Fisheries Local Action Group (NESFLAG) approved the allocation of over £60,000 from the European Maritime and Fisheries Fund (EMFF) for training equipment and to fund a part-time (2 days per week) training post for the duration of a two-year seafood industry Training Centre pilot project. The project is being led and match-funded by the Scottish Seafood Association (SSA) and will deliver a range of specialised courses certified to Royal Environment Health Institute for Scotland (REHIS) and Seafish standards, including advanced food hygiene, sensory assessment and fish smoking training to upskill the existing workforce, while new entrants to industry will be provided with a structured induction programme covering health and safety, basic knife skills and food hygiene.
- 2.2 A key component of the project will be getting out into wider community and into schools, colleges and the hospitality sector to promote seafood industry-related careers. This project aligns closely with Scottish Government's Ambition 2030 strategy which aims to double the value of the Scottish food and drink sector to £30 billion by 2030.
- 2.3 Terms were agreed in March 2018 with Michael Sim, former Managing Director of Young's Seafood in Fraserburgh to deliver technical advice and training to local seafood companies under the project. Mr Sim, who took up his new role on 4 June 2018, has 30 years' experience in delivering food-related training and accreditation to the highest level (BRC) and his appointment is a very significant development. The project has recently attracted further financial support from Seafish (via the Scottish Seafood Training Network), Scottish Government, Aberdeenshire Council and funding from private industry sources to extend its reach.
- 2.4 SSA sees the project as an important and timely stepping stone for the wider processing sector: to enhance skills levels and accreditation standards, and to help make the industry more attractive as a career of choice.
- 2.5 Training will be delivered primarily in Peterhead and in Fraserburgh. However much of the training kit is portable and so it can be transported to wherever training needs lie. The hope is that the project can develop sufficient momentum beyond the term of the two pilot to become self-sustaining.

- 2.6 As part of the project, a derogation was obtained from the Animal and Plant Health Authority (APHA) to allow fish 'discards' landed at NE ports to be used for training purposes. Discards are not allowed to enter the human food chain and are generally collected at ports for onward transport to be converted into fishmeal. The derogation allows discards to be removed from the fishmeal supply chain, weighed, used for training purposes and then returned to the fishmeal supply chain - thereby taking significant raw material costs out of the equation and improving the affordability and likely uptake of training.
- 2.7 Key outputs of the project are as follows:
- 100 seafood companies to be assisted over the 2 years of the pilot
 - 400 trainees (around 100 of which are expected to be new entrants)
 - 2000 hours of training delivered

Progress updates will be provided to members in due course.

3 Scheme of Governance

North East Scotland Fisheries Development Partnership is able to consider this item in terms of its remit to provide a North East Scotland focus to enable issues and concerns across the fisheries and related sectors to be addressed. This includes strengthening economic development links between fisheries science, catching and processing sectors and the wider seafood industry, contributing to regional and local priorities for the fisheries sector, improving links between marine environment and biodiversity and contributing to policy development and consultations.
